Dallas Youth Garden 2016 Program Summary

The Dallas Youth Garden is a non-traditional 4H jobs program that provides summer internships to teens. Each intern in our program is responsible for developing a 25'x50' market garden using sustainable gardening principles. Interns gain job and leadership skills, learn agricultural practices and become aware of hunger in our community. All produce from our garden is donated to local food programs.

Program Goals

- 1. Provide paid summer internships to Dallas High School students.
- 2. Donate fresh produce to feed the hungry in our community.

Program Objectives

- 1. Interns learn job skills by planning, developing and maintaining market gardens using sustainable gardening methods.
- 2. Interns learn leadership skills by participating in leadership exercises that focus on communication, education, civic engagement, and garden improvement.
- 3. People served by Dallas-area food assistance programs have increased access to fresh produce.

Community Need

- Our youth need summer jobs and need to learn soft job skills to prepare them for the job market.
- 2. Our youth need to learn leadership skills.
- 3. Many families in Polk County need food assistance and experience hunger.

Primary Accomplishments for 2016

- 1. <u>Summer jobs and learning soft job skills</u>: Our program provided job application and interview experience to sixteen Dallas youth and provided job experience to nine interns and one alternate. Interns learned about time management, managing job expectations, and team leadership. Interns maintained a monthly time sheet, managed vacation and sick time, tracked progress with a weekly blog, and recorded harvest totals. Interns were evaluated at the end of the season and their performance discussed.
- 2. <u>Leadership Skills</u>: Interns completed at least three leadership projects; one each in education, community communication and garden improvement. Projects included opening a bank account, researching hunger needs in Oregon, public speaking, bee keeping, cooking with garden produce, and reviewing garden pesticides. Weekly leadership projects were discussed by the interns and garden supervisors. Interns entered exhibits in both the Polk County and Oregon State Fairs winning many ribbons including three champion and one reserve champion ribbon. Each intern supervised a work crew to learn about supervising. Interns also sold peaches and discussed the garden at our booth at the Polk County Fair.
- 3. <u>Food assistance</u>: We delivered over 5600 pounds of produce to the Willamette Valley Food Assistance Program in weekly deliveries from July to October. Our fresh produce deliveries positively impacted the 300 families who are members of the Food Assistance Program.

A Quick Review

We had a great season this year. Garden productivity was up, we added another intern, and help from the master gardeners was great! Interns better understood what quality produce was, thanks in part to fair exhibits. The new time sheets worked and interns tracked time off much better. Alternating watering times each day made better use of limited water pressure and time. As always we can improve the garden experience with additional equipment (see last page). Leadership projects were interesting and we had some good discussions as a result. Interns found group work projects valuable and we will need to do more of them. The new job evaluation worked well and we will do two next year instead of just one. Offering bonuses to recognize outstanding work was beneficial and will continue to evolve. Offering extra pay for post season support really helped and will be continued. We had an OK harvest from our bean experiment but the beans and small tomatoes took too much time to harvest. We could lime tomatoes more and do better working with interns on weed control. Some interns were really on top of the weeding while others really struggled. Finally, we made a good start on a new governance model.

First Half of the Season

We made a great start to the 2016 garden season. We hired nine interns, expanded the garden and continued to focus on job training and gardening skills.
